Dublin Core Field	How to complete the field	LC Pied Piper Poster example: https://www.loc.gov/item/95506493/
Title	Where the item does not have a title, provide a summary in a sentence, not just a few words. Don't include elements for which there are specific fields; eg date, creator.	Follow the Pied Piper. Join the United States School Garden Army
Subject	The subject(s) of the item. Often a controlled vocabulary – eg Library of Congress Subject Headings – but for this project it would be more useful to develop your own controlled vocabulary of subjects that are related to your research question	Children Gardening Uncle Sam (Symbolic Character) War Posters
Description	The description includes some overlap with title, but it is the place for a more detailed summary of the item	Poster shows Uncle Sam playing a fife, leading a group of children carrying gardening tools and a seed bag.
Creator	Author; could also be an organization or agency	Barney, Maginel Wright, 1877-1966
Source	Where the document came from; for digitized items, the source is the publisher of the original item	The Graphic Company

CREATING LOCAL LINKAGES

Publisher	Who made it available; for online digitized items, the publisher is the entity who created the digitized version of the item	Library of Congress
Date	Use a standard format, preferably YYYY-MM-DD	1919
Contributor	The person who adds the item to the Omeka collection	YOU
Rights	The copyright status of the item; this should include a link to the source of that information	Public domain: https://www.loc.gov/rr/print/res/243_wwipos.html
Relation	A related source; eg sources referred to in this source, or sources that are part of the same collection, or the collection that the source comes from	World War 1 Posters Collection: https://www.loc.gov/collections/world-war-i-posters/about-this-collection/
Format	The file format of the digitized item	GIF, JPEG, TIFF
Language	The language of the digitized item	English

CREATING LOCAL LINKAGES

Type	The type of document. Dublin Core includes some item types, but you will probably want to use more precise genres: eg Dublin Core has a Text item type; you might want to use different types of text, such as letter, annual report, newspaper etc.	Prints--Color
Identifier	A unique identifier for the item; for digitized sources this could be a URL or a DOI that links directly to the source	https://www.loc.gov/item/95506493/
Coverage	Location or time period of the item	1910-1920
